'Garden Play!_'

Spring is here again, and so too, is gardening! Not all people like gardening, however, and there are times when it can be maddeningly frustrating. Who hasn't successfully tidied a border, only to find the next day that there are still weeds, smiling defiantly at us? Who hasn't fought to maintain a neat and presentable lawn, only for ants and unrepentant worms to renew their guerrilla warfare against us?



However, balancing the physical labour and frustration

of creating and maintaining a garden, there are huge compensations, whether you are a beginner, an expert or an 'enthusiastic potterer'. And we can even bring a little theology to bear upon our musings, but I won't write about 'the best way to garden, like praying, is on your knees'!

Firstly, the enormous range of trees, shrubs, flowers and vegetables that we can plant, can all speak to us of the extraordinary richness and variety of God's creation. Many of us as children in Sunday School were taught those rather sugary 19th century hymns which gave a somewhat naïve picture of nature and ignored its less attractive features. Along with roses come thorns and suckers, black spot and greenfly! Perhaps, therefore, the weeds and brambles and garden 'pests' remind us that the world God gave us is no Eden (with Adam as a 'gentleman gardener') but a vale for soul-making, where we were meant to struggle against adversity, and – by God's grace and with his strength – triumph.



Secondly, whilst no one would suggest that gardening should be the basis for natural (as opposed to revealed) theology, we might nonetheless ask, 'How does the process of planting, tending, nurturing and pruning speak to us of the way in which we use our God-given gifts generally?' It comes as no surprise, for example, that Paul's letters are littered with gardening metaphors to get his points across: e.g. to the Romans (Ch. 11 vs. 17f.); to the people of Corinth (I Cor. 3 vs. 6f. and again in II Cor. 9 vs. 10f.). And you won't need me

to remind you of Jesus' own illustration of the vine and the branches in John 15.

Even if there's only room for window boxes and patio pots a tiny garden can still offer many challenges and opportunities. When we are older, it's very easy to become disheartened if we feel that the contribution we can make has diminished. But there are always possibilities for fulfilment, even in old age.

Finally, to see plants grow is a perpetual source of wonder. I once asked my mother-in-law (who could get almost anything to grow), "What's the difference between a plant and a weed?" She answered, with a smile, "If it lives, it's a weed; if it dies, it's a plant." Some would say that a weed is simply a plant in the wrong place. Now, there's an interesting line of thought, if we apply it to the whole of the natural world!



However, despite our best efforts, it's as well to remind ourselves that we can actually create NOTHING. We are simply co-operating with God to try to bring order, interest and beauty to fruition, as it were. Psychologists tell us that it is all too easy to bury the 'child' within each of us as we grow older, and that we should never lose a sense of either wonder or curiosity. To put it another way – if you are as incompetent a gardener as I can be, then to see tomatoes or runner beans or dahlias or sweet peas emerge can be a paradigm of our attitude to life in general, and simply reaffirms our sense of dependence upon the grace of God for all that we are or seek to be.

A Prayer: Loving God, we thank you for the simplicity of a single rose in a vase, and the infinite complexity of the natural world that surrounds us, and which we enjoy. Help us to value, preserve and cherish the natural gifts you shower upon us, and always to retain a sense of child-like wonder at the marvels of your creation. Amen.
