At the end of March, we had the usual Good Friday service, this time at Elmbridge where more than 50 people worshipped together at a service led by Elmbridge's chaplain Rev Allan Taylor. We also enjoyed a communion service of rejoicing with Rev Claire Hargreaves and a colourful flower bedecked cross on Easter Sunday.

Our regular Wednesday group meet every other week to enjoy fellowship, speakers and coffee! The Baby Bank continues each Tuesday and sometimes on Sunday as well. Time out Together attracts many parents and young children to enjoy a social time where they can get to know each other, the children play and the parents pop into the Baby Bank for much needed replacement clothes or other essential equipment. We find we give out only slightly more than we receive, so our turnover of everything a child needs from birth to 5 years old, plus maternity wear and toys, means we are very busy! We are hoping to have a table at a local sale soon, to sell some of the toys and books to replenish our funds to buy nappies and powdered milk.

The church is planning, for a second year, to have a stall outside the church on the local Lions Carnival Day, Saturday 29 June. We will sell whatever we have donated to us, books, bric-a-brac, toys etc. This and the ploughman's lunches, which were very popular last year, will again hopefully yield much needed funds to boost our own church coffers.

Our rooms have been let, on occasions, to the local U3A and have become increasingly popular so we are hoping the classes they organise will increase the frequency of their lets, for their new term starting in September.

Our church will celebrate its 120th anniversary with a service led by Dave Paterson on 9 June. This will be very low key compared to our 100th, back in 2004, when we had a year of events, printed coffee mugs and an embroidered montage (completed by our own members), picturing all the activities our church generated. Although almost all of them are still in operation, many of them are scaled back to take into account our diminished numbers and our ageing congregation, but all of us are still as active and as passionate about worshipping together and in our own church, so we solider on as best we can.

On 17th March, Circuit Superintendent Rev Paul Glass led morning service and presented our dear friend Kath Benny with a certificate to mark 70 years (actually now 72) of Local Preaching (*see page 15*).

Kath grew up within a loving Christian family at Mickleover just outside Derby, getting involved in Sunday School, (developing her public speaking skills at anniversary performances!), church choir, the Wesley Guild, Derby Methodist Mission Hall, holidays at Methodist Guest Houses and so on.

As a student at Royal Holloway College, she joined Egham Methodist Church and, under the influence of Rev Ronald Rawlings, became an active member of their Youth Group, assisting with services throughout the Staines Circuit. She clearly remembers Whit Sunday 1950, during communion at Egham church, feeling the warm touch of heavenly joy flood through her that was her calling from God - to a lifetime of service and worship. The memory of the great joy, peace and security of that evening has stayed with her clearly ever since. So, Kath started training to be a Local Preacher (while continuing her teacher-training and becoming engaged to Alan!), becoming fully accredited in 1952.

And how times have changed. After her first full service she recalls a gentleman taking her aside and quoting St Paul: "Let your women keep silence in the churches!" Fortunately for us, Kath remained true to her calling, juggling preaching with marriage, three children, and teaching – latterly at Godalming College - simultaneously taking her faith out into the community with involvement with Churches Together and the Cellar Café. Thank you, Kath – you have been a blessing to us. Congratulations!

Sidney Herbert Sime and the Sime Gallery

The Sime Gallery, Worplesdon, houses much of the surviving work of Sidney Sime. Sidney Herbert Sime (1865 – 1941) left an amazing body of work but is probably one of the least well-known British artists of the late 19th/early 20th centuries.

In its small, low-key way, the Sime Gallery is seeking to address this by organising exhibitions of his work both locally (The Lightbox, Woking 2017) and further afield (Chris Beetles Gallery, London earlier this year). The gallery itself restores and conserves work by Sime, displaying nearly 90 pictures (with another 500 held in the collection) and is open to the public free of charge, 2pm – 4pm, on Wednesdays and Sundays.

Often compared to William Blake (1757 – 1827) and his contemporaries Aubrey Beardsley (1872 – 1898), Arthur Rackham (1867 – 1939) and the Danish artist Kay Neilson (1886 – 1957) Sime's work ranged from large oil paintings to incredibly detailed black and white illustrations for books and magazines (like *Tatler*, *Punch* and *The Idler*), set designs for London West End theatres and caricatures of Worplesdon locals.

Always interested in fantasy landscapes, Sime became, after being invalided out of World War I, increasingly obsessed with depictions from the Book of Revelation, the Vision of St John the Divine and the Apocrypha.

His reclusive nature probably has much to do with his lack of recognition today. After his death his reputation languished, and his work was consigned to obscurity.

The phrase "a hidden gem" is often overused, but the Sime Gallery really is a place of undiscovered treasures. The gallery is a charitable organisation run by a team of volunteers, and their knowledge and enthusiasm ensure any visitor comes away knowing a lot more about this much forgotten local artist and his work. There is also the opportunity to purchase tea, coffee and cake after your visit. There is a heritage trail which features various local landmarks which have close links to Sidney Sime and his work.

If you can't visit in person do take some time to visit the website – you'll be amazed.

Guildford St Mary's

Times of change

This Spring is a time of change and development at St Mary's, taking forward ministry and outreach. We're missing Paul Glass during his sabbatical but look forward to his return refreshed and renewed in July.

Our new Rector, Canon Simon Butler, is settling in well. Inevitably, after his predecessor's 27-year tenure, a fresh pair of eyes spots areas for change and improvement and we're very grateful that Simon values and supports the outreach work and opportunities which St Mary's undertakes. It's also pleasing that, as a hymn enthusiast, he enjoys making use of Singing the Faith, bringing him a range of hymns he hasn't used before.

Our relationship with the Orthodox congregation who worship in St Mary's fortnightly continues to grow in warmth and we can learn from each other. It was a privilege recently to host the first Orthodox funeral held at St Mary's. Very sadly, a Ukrainian refugee in her 50s died after a very short illness so her daughter, with the support of friends and neighbours, had to arrange her funeral not many months after coming to the UK. It was wonderful to see people rally round to support her. We learned of two Ukrainian traditions - one that people bring flowers to the funeral to be placed in the coffin and another that no one can leave feeling hungry. Tulips were a favourite flower of the deceased and many, many tulips didn't make it into the coffin and were left with us after the service. The tables were groaning with the weight of food. The service itself was very moving with the rite conducted entirely by the priest and a singer, so rather a passive experience for those from our tradition.

One thing which hasn't changed, unfortunately, is the world situation prompting our weekly Vigil for Peace – indeed, with Israel/ Palestine and Sudan having been added to the focus – its scope has sadly grown. We therefore continue to open each Friday from 9-11pm. By the end of April, we'd provided over 100 evening Vigils with total attendance exceeding 8,000 people. Our team of helpers (sincere thanks to them all) continue to give up most of their Friday evenings – whilst one might sometimes feel a little unenthusiastic about heading to church on a Friday evening, yet again, we all feel by the end of the evening that God has blessed us with more valuable encounters during our time there.

Most of our visitors continue to be surprised at finding themselves in a church during their Friday night out but, on entering, many exhibit a sense of wonderment at the atmosphere in the church and all leave expressing gratitude. Recent highlights have been youngsters coming back after earlier visits, with one young woman bringing other friends in for the first time and explaining to her friends that this is 'her church', just as a result of coming in for Vigils. Another visitor proved to be a teacher from another town who asked for a set of the PowerPoint slides we use as a prompt for prayers – so she could use it in lessons dealing with the world's conflict situations and in the school assembly.

We also value the overlap with Street Angels as they prepare to go out on their Friday night duties. We feel we're handing over the Christian 'baton' to them as they set out on their patrol at 11pm. They appreciate the atmosphere they find in the church when they arrive to prepare for their duties and the bonds between us are strengthening.

Guildford St. Mary's continued

In May we made history with the first Methodist-conducted wedding in the 1,000 year history of St. Mary's – quite a milestone to celebrate. The only downside was that Banns were not required - a task for Anglican Weddings which our Methodist preachers have always been quite excited to perform!

Practical Aspects of Spirituality comes under the umbrella of our Common Ground community and in recent years it's looked at a range of spiritual disciplines. On Saturday 22 June we home in on the Wesleys' ideas of spirituality. We're thrilled that the session will be led by Rev Allan Taylor, with the title 'real Christians' not 'almost Christians'. I'm confident that attending from 9.30am to 12 noon will be well worth your time.

On Paul's return in July, we'll be embarking on Bible Month – linked preaching and group discussions focussed on a particular book of the Bible. After the success of looking at Revelation last year, we expect to switch to the beginning of the Bible this year.

Busy and exciting times ahead!

We also marked Christian Aid Week, where on 11th May we gathered for a street collection outside Waitrose in Goldsworth Park, Woking. We were joined by helpers from the other Knaphill churches, where we prayed for success with the house-to-house collections.

On 23rd June, we are celebrating the Church Anniversary. Rev Nick Oborski is returning to preach and we are having a faith lunch afterwards, for people to enjoy fellowship. In July, we begin a preaching series on Genesis to mark Bible Month. The start of this coincides with Paul's return from sabbatical – much refreshed, we trust.

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Walton-on-Thames

The ripples from the conflict in Israel and Palestine reached Walton in March. Due to concerns from other local churches, we were pleased to step up into the breach and offer our sanctuary to host this years' World Day of Prayer in Walton. The service was beautiful, inspiring and profound as we learned more about the lives and spirituality of Christian Palestinians. The 55 people who turned up for it drew much from it. We kept the service book and have used elements from the prayers in a recent local arrangement service.

At Walton we have a tradition of running Lent groups and this year we picked Selina Stone's new book – *Tarry Awhile*. The book was not only a study for Lent but shared much wisdom gathered from Black Spirituality for any people of faith interested in this. An added dimension was that it gives a unique insight into a black theologians' view of Christianity and her faith. She explains that tarrying is a black Christian spiritual practice which answers 'yes' to the question Jesus once asked his disciples. Whether in the vibrancy of musicians singing, or in hushed silence, people of all ages actively "Tarry" for an encounter with God that will transform what we know, what we feel, and experience day to day.

We ran three lent groups. One afternoon and one evening studying the book, and an additional group which ran the Taketime contemplative meditations for the Lent lectionary readings meeting on a Thursday night, for a time of quiet Ignatian styled reflection. We Zoomed this out as well for those who preferred to stay at home. These groups offered much opportunity for deep reflection, vibrant discussion, and debate pushing at the edges of our experience, comfort zones and faith. Perfect Lenten Soul Food! It was interesting to see how the groups took on the challenges of what this book offered – especially the discussions about Healing, "Quiet", Weeping and the power of the Holy Spirit to bring people to God.

During Holy Week we had a reflective service on Maundy Thursday and for Good Friday it was good to share a service with Weybridge. Our Easter Service was taken by Dave Paterson and was preceded by another robust debate about "why local preachers cannot offer communion..."

Although people were disappointed at not having a communion service on Easter Sunday, Dave planned an excellent service and took the congregation through the Easter story in a few different ways using our Easter Garden, a daffodil cross and a makeshift crafted cardboard empty tomb, creatively using these props to illustrate his sermon points.

Your circuit needs you.....

This was the title of an article in 'Flight Path' -the circuit magazine of the former Woking & Walton-on-Thames circuit – in March 2011. As I had recently retired from full time employment I decided to seek further information. The help needed was as a Circuit Secretary to take up responsibility for organising and recording meetings plus any other admin associated with the Circuit team. After meeting with the superintendent and senior circuit steward I was invited to take up the position which was ratified at the July circuit meeting in 2011. By September of that year the then Circuit Leadership Team invited me to become a full circuit steward whilst continuing with responsibility for the above tasks.

In 2015 the Woking & Walton-on-Thames circuit stewards began discussions with the Guildford team concerning the possibility of a merger. These initial talks failed but were reopened in 2016. This second round was considerably more structured and involved full consultation with all church members across both circuits and a formal vote at the March 2017 circuit meeting which supported a merger. The interim joint CLT then set about the process of full merger and the Wey Valley Circuit was formally recognised in September 2017.

Anyone who does the maths will see that by 2017 I had completed six years as a circuit steward – the usual term. However, Rev Dr Claire Potter, the first superintendent of the Wey Valley Circuit, decided to reset the clock and the majority of the circuit stewards from the constituent circuits continued for various terms in the new circuit. As members retired and with the lack of new volunteers, I have served an additional year in Wey Valley as ratified by the July 2023 circuit meeting.

The role of a circuit steward is varied, never static and also never solo! There is a circuit steward team!!! Our current Senior Circuit Steward, Jean Normington, has a list of tasks for which the circuit steward TEAM are responsible. It may look daunting, but it is always a team effort. The role gives the Circuit steward the privilege of working with our presbyters to run the circuit, to help decide and progress the direction of the circuit. To support the presbyters at all church council meetings, circuit meetings and the circuit invitations meetings. In addition, circuit stewards support the presbyters in their very busy lives (a presbyter isn't just for Sunday!) and help ensure that presbyters have a sensible work/life balance. They may also be requested to assist a presbyter who is taking a sabbatical by attending the sabbatical support team.

The CS team also lead the process for Stationing in the circuit (but with full support from the District team) whether for re-invitation of a presbyter or new incumbent, whenever the circuit circumstance's dictate. This is a complex but interesting area and it changes slightly every time so no chance to get bored.

Does this all sound daunting? It is at all times a team role and team members have different skills, your skill could play a vital part in the future success of the CS team. You don't have to be retired to volunteer for the team; one of the current team members is in full employment and others are in part time employment.

It has been my privilege to serve for so long and I expect that I shall miss it (until I find something else to fill the time). I have served with many lovely and talented circuit members and got to know many people I would never have come into contact with prior to the circuit merger.

Please consider very carefully if you can join Jean and the TEAM. You certainly don't have to serve for anywhere near as long as I have, an offer of a couple of years will be gratefully accepted But...... YOUR CIRCUIT NEEDS YOU

Trinity, Woking

We all like to 'belong' to things, don't we?

In my case various coffee shop loyalty card schemes, a Kindle Unlimited subscription, and the Crystal Palace FC mailing list!

I jest, but at Trinity we 'belong' to Churches Together in Woking, and Woking People of Faith, organisations which are both active in the town.

Pedagogues say we learn best by doing. So, we're learning by being Christian people of faith in Woking.

Once upon a time there was an NHS building in Woking, which housed some great charities working in an area of deprivation, with folk from minority and excluded groups.

The week before Christmas 2023, the ceiling of the building partially collapsed, and asbestos was found in the walls, so the charities were made homeless literally overnight.

We'd worked with Woking Mind a few years ago when the same unfortunate building had a car drive into its wall. So, Catalyst - the charity which took on Woking Mind's portfolio when it sadly closed last year- called us and asked if they could use our kitchen to cook Christmas dinner for 30+ people pretty much the next day. Of course we said yes, to that and to regular twice a week delivery and then we got a call from another of the groups Shifa, a charity working with women, most from the south Asian community, many of whom are Muslim. We quickly moved around furniture and turned our Kabin into a temporary office for them, with space for delivery twice a week. A lovely lady from the Richmond Fellowship, which offers 1-2-1 support for people with poor mental health to get back into work, came along and asked if we could accommodate her twice a week.

We look for God in all sorts of places, don't we? And God has made themselves known to us in this other way too; even if our relationship with these charities is 'temporary' in the sense that their building may be rebuilt, the relationships are hopefully enduring.

Yes, we are earning enough income from the additional hirers to make a meaningful contribution towards our running costs, but we are building relationships with people of all faiths, and none, and making a positive contribution to Woking's civic society.

Going forward, as we build on the successes of the Foundry project, Trinity hopes to continue to be at the interface of God, Church and Community in Woking, making intentional connections between all three, with God at the centre.
