

#### A Message From Our Superintendent

Dear Friends.

Welcome to this edition of the *Wey Forward*. Leadership means lots of different things to lots of different people and there are many different styles of doing it.

I was taught a collaborative style in college. Decisions are best taken by groups and teams of people working together where responsibility is shared. Sometimes we feel as though we want the heroic leader out in front saying 'this is the way...follow me'. Actually, that style of leadership has been shown time and again not to work.

I worked with a senior leader who had actually done a PhD in educational management. He had looked closely at Jim Collins book 'Good to Great' and he had come up with a number of ways of transferring the thinking of that book to school situations. 'Get the right person sat on the right seat on the bus' was a key phrase. In other words, get the right person doing the right role and then largely trust them to do the work that they have been entrusted with...micro-managing never helped anybody.

As a circuit I am deeply indebted to our CLT - our Circuit Leadership Team - they do an amazing job and we are still looking for people to join us. As Shaun Sanders joins us in his role of leadership in the churches at the north end of the circuit, the CLT will be having an away day in September to plan and envision together. There is no magic wand, and we are facing the same kinds of challenges as every other circuit in the country.

One of the books that I read on sabbatical was called 'How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going'. It talked about the church generally being in an 'in-between' time at the moment - where one thing is finishing and we are looking to see what happens next. That kind of experience can be nerve-wracking and full of anxiety. But the author suggests that it is worth not rushing through that 'liminal' time because it is often in that time of uncertainty and anxiety that we meet God in the most powerful of ways.

Keep the CLT of the circuit in your prayers. As I've said there is no magic wand or quick fix but together, as we seek the mind of God, I believe that new things and new ways of being will emerge.



Thank you to everyone in the circuit for your support and encouragement and for making Paul, Elishama and me feel so welcome.




We will miss you all but hope to stay in touch and see you again soon.

#### **Cranleigh**

Allan continues to be Chaplain at the local Elmbridge Retirement Village visiting twice a week, to support both staff and residents and he is a regular to the various court coffee mornings to see and be seen. His guidance, insight and support are invaluable. Elmbridge itself celebrated its 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary as the first retirement village of its kind, opened in the UK, on 21<sup>st</sup> May. We have a faith group meeting shortly when we start planning the annual carol service for December when we expect at least 90 to attend - the draw here is the mulled wine and the mince pies.

Thank you...and hopefully the enrichment that the sabbatical has provided will make itself seen over the next few months...



#### Hope, Heritage and more at Guildford St Mary's

**Hope** is at the heart of our Christian message, and we're delighted to be echoing that theme in a special exhibition to be staged at St Mary's over Heritage Weekend (13<sup>th</sup> to 15<sup>th</sup> September). A small selection are shown at the bottom of this piece.



For 15 years, women prisoners at HMP Send have been encouraged to develop their artistic talents, thanks to a partnership between Watts Gallery Trust, the Michael Varah Memorial Fund ('MVMF') and HMP Send. Not only do the prisoners create accomplished works of art in weekly tutored sessions; since 2017 they have also planned and curated an annual in-prison exhibition for invited guests, learning new transferable skills including design, marketing, budgeting, time management, patience and public speaking.

The Prison Governor stated in the catalogue for their most recent Our Time exhibition that one of the many positive things the programme gives is Hope. Giving women belief in their ability to effect change and achieve a goal is recognised as reducing the risk of reoffending. The programme has clearly enhanced participants' self-belief, along with developing many transferable skills along the way.

A number of people connected with St. Mary's and the wider Parish volunteer regularly at HMP Send and hosting our exhibition acknowledges and strengthens that relationship. We hope it will provide interest for visitors to St Mary's and encouragement for the artists, even though they cannot attend in person. Artworks will be available for purchase (with a proportion of the proceeds going to support victims of crime in Surrey and the MVMF).

The exhibition will be open Friday and Sunday 12 noon to 4pm and Saturday 10am to 4pm. Do come along and enjoy the wide range of creative and inspiring art on display. During the Saturday opening, Brownies and Guides will be running a café as well. If you can't make it during Heritage Weekend, the art will remain on display for our normal opening the following week (11am to 3pm on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> September and 11am to 3pm on Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> September).

Having taken breath after that exhibition, and our Harvest Weekend, we'll be moving on to *Celebrating Women of the Bible* - a series of events running from 29<sup>th</sup> October to 17<sup>th</sup> November. This will mark the

Faith, Courage and Wisdom of 7 women (not the most prominent) who feature in the Bible.

The series is centred on seven icon-style paintings of these women, accompanied by poems written by Bishop Graham Kings and culminating with a concert on the evening of Friday 15<sup>th</sup> November incorporating the art, poetry and anthems inspired by them.



We will be making use of these resources during many of our normal activities as well as hosting a series of special sessions, including our autumn Practical Aspects of Spirituality on Saturday morning, 16<sup>th</sup> November. A detailed programme will be issued to all Circuit churches in September.

Guildford St. Mary's continued.....

It promises to be a busy and exciting autumn. Of course, our weekly Vigil for Peace will be continuing on Friday evenings - total attendance has now reached over 9,500 and we are grateful to have had the opportunity to touch their lives in a very small way.

And, before we know it, our Lunchtime Advent Reflections will be upon us (starting Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> November).

We hope to see friends from around the circuit at some of these events.



We worked very hard in Knaphill, as usual, and raised £2300 for Christian Aid, by a combination of house to house, deliver only, street, church and online collections. Many thanks are due to all who helped in any way.

We had a very pleasant (and substantial) faith lunch on 23<sup>rd</sup> June, for our Church Anniversary. This followed an excellent service taken by several members of the Oborski family. Rev Nick Oborski, a past minister at KMC, had been invited back to lead the anniversary service and his wife, Sandra, and son, Tom, also participated.

The clothing bank continues to be well used. This was very evident on the most recent occasion, Saturday 20<sup>th</sup> July. In spite of reasonably nice weather and a summer fete in the village, a large number of people came to look for clothing and went away with a good range of items for both adults and children.

July services have focused on the book of Genesis, for Bible Month, so we are now well-versed in all the stories therein. All of the services on this topic were very good and it was interesting to hear how different preachers approached the themes involved.

September will be a busy month at KMC. We start with our Covenant Service on 1<sup>st</sup>, followed by a special Coffee Morning for KSSAAT (Kent Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance Trust) on 7<sup>th</sup>, led by Tarina Berry. Last year's event raised over £1000 for KSSAAT, so the pressure is on this time! Later in the month we will again be collecting for the Whitechapel Mission at our Harvest Service. There will also be our regular Clothing Bank on 21<sup>st</sup>, and Coffee Morning for church funds on 28<sup>th</sup>, so a busy time all told.

What a great lesson! It is so easy to make our prayers about us - "Help me... deliver me... give me... show me... I need... I want..." when our prayers should be for and about others.







#### **Creation Boards**

At Messy Fun Church we explore the bible in very different ways to conventional church or Junior Church, even.

Messy Church, Muddy Church and Forest Church open the bible to families who would not always necessarily come to church. This could be for many reasons, the biggest being their children got bored, or they struggle to sit still long enough to listen due to ADD, ADHD, Autism etc. Therefore – Messy Fun Church is perfect for all children and their parents.

The team and I plan together half a year of bible stories, parables etc. to engage with our families. If the truth be known, it doesn't always go to plan, because we have many children who find it hard to even participate due to communication challenges and language barriers. We are determined not to give up on them though: the challenge is for us to keep looking for other methods to share the Gospel with them in ways that they can access more easily and find meaningful.

We therefore decided to work with the theme of creation for a month.

We put a basic plan in place; we had no idea how it would unfold. Then we explored our cupboards for craft inspiration. We found plastic boards we repurposed, coloured sand, old plastic pots, wire, various different crafting things and some very old plaster bandages.

Who knew what they would soon become!

The pictures you can see show how the display developed over a series of weeks – provoking many interesting conversations with people who visit our church.

One child, who struggles to engage due to autism and language issues, began to get involved with the project.

It was beautiful to watch as we finally had a connection; he became part of the story of creation and he was able to connect with us and other children and God.

This is why I say, we never know how Messy Fun Church is going to work from week to week, as children connect in many different ways, but God does not give up on any of us, and nor should we!
