


The Wey Valley Methodist Circuit

A Message From Our Superintendent

The Christmas story gives us two important ways of describing Jesus. He is Emmanuel - God with us and he is the Prince of Peace.

In a world that is in dire need of peace this Christmas, I wonder what that might look like?

Recently I was fortunate enough to attend the induction of Rabbi Alex Goldberg as the first named Rabbi of Guildford since 1275. There were Jews, Muslims, Christians, Hindus and Humanists at that joyful event.

In his address to us the Chief Rabbi, Sir Ephraim Mirvis drew our attention to the fact that the Jewish word for 'dove' and 'pigeon' is exactly the same word. He pointed out that Noah released a bird from the Ark to see if the flood waters had gone down. He pointed out that the bird could have been either a dove or a pigeon and that fact is actually rather important. The dove is well known as a symbol of peace. What is slightly less well known is that the pigeon as a carrier of messages is known as a symbol of communication.

He wisely pointed out that true peace is not possible without good, open, honest, wise, thoughtful communication.

That congregation gathered to welcome a new Rabbi to Guildford was a fantastic sign of the peace that we long to see.

As we look to Christmas this year, may each one of us think and pray about how we may best use our resources as individuals and as churches to be servants of the Prince of Peace in the world.

The Wey Navigation

I really enjoyed Shaun Sanders' Circuit Letter about his discovery of the River Wey, because I have lived near the Wey Navigation for nearly 60 years. The Wey was one of the first rivers in England to be made navigable when the River Wey Navigation opened in 1653, with 12 locks between Weybridge and Guildford. Near me, the River Wey runs through Brooklands with its twists and turns while the Navigation takes the smoother passage under the M25 and through New Haw which I thought nicely added to the idea of Jesus calming the Sea of Galilee.

The River Wey though is really our circuit river, with the Navigation also providing links on the Basingstoke Canal



directly into Woking and the Godalming Navigation into Godalming. Walton of course has the Thames, but it needs the Wey to get to most of our other churches. As Shaun says, using the river nowadays is unlikely, but I do remember one of our Byfleet ministers cycling along the towpath from the Byfleet manse to visit our people in New Haw.



In August, Eloise, following a long-held Rowling family tradition, accompanied the band on its annual summer mission/holiday – this year to the Lake District and Cumbria. They started at Wigton giving a concert and leading worship, finishing up a week later at Ulverston with a concert and Sunday worship. They were blessed with lovely weather and bagged two Wainwrights – Brim Fell and Swirl How – on their "day off".

Their theme for the week was "Journeying with God", following the ups and downs of the story of Moses. This was used as a vehicle for reflecting on personal journeys with God – how in each season of our lives we can hand over our burdens to Him.

This year's tour brought the return of the Chapel Crawl, last done in 2011. This involved covering 50 chapels in one day, for which the band split in half, with one team covering the northern half of the region and the other visiting the south. In each church they played Deep Harmony, shared in a reading and a prayer, and finished with two verses of a hymn tune. Starting at 7am and finishing at 9pm the challenge was completed. A truly unique and special experience, reaching out to so many people in one day, travelling together to share some of their story and bringing inspiration. What a terrific week!

Sylvia Kelley

Sadly, we must report the death of our dear friend Sylvia Kelley in August.

Sylvia lived out a life of Christian love and commitment both in our church, the town, the wider Methodist circuit and in our struggling world - through the charitable work she shared with her husband Ryan.

Born and growing up in Woking, she began her working life as a primary school teacher (a "natural"). But in 1975, having met and married Ryan – who managed Whitmore Vale Home for adults with learning difficulties at Hindhead - she made the switch to running their day centre, a position she held for 30+ years.

Meanwhile in Godalming she grappled with the task of creating Godalming United Church from the merger of the two neighbouring churches – Methodist and URC - on either side of the river. Across the years she served on most of our church committees, latterly as Church Secretary. She was involved with both older folk and children, and an authority on Safeguarding.

Meanwhile under the Kelleys' guidance, through the Mission and Outreach Committee and in association with Whitmore Vale, GUC's charitable work burgeoned. A remarkable link was developed with The Gambia, the 67th container of supplies for schools and clinics being shipped off earlier this year. The West African link led to an especially close relationship with Grace and Daniel Pratt Morris Chapman who were always welcome at the Kelleys' home with their growing family when on leave from their missionary work.

Sylvia's life was both prayerful and practical: she prayed, discerned and listened. She was a wise, kindly and modest friend to us all and will be greatly missed.

Guildford St Mary's

Art for Art's Christ's Sake

I must start with a confession – art appreciation has never been my strong point, even less had art formed a significant part of my faith journey until recently. From childhood to arriving in Guildford, I worshipped regularly in four Methodist churches, I can't recall art ever featuring in what was on offer. Indeed, it barely featured in our first 30 years in Guildford.

Moving to St Mary's gave us the impetus to explore different approaches and art has grown enormously in significance as we've come to appreciate how it can help in various ways, both for our benefit as a Christian community and in our outreach.

We started gently using works of art as a focus in our Lent and Advent reflections, prompting discussion. The location and appeal of our building make St Mary's an excellent location for exhibitions and we're learning how to make the most of the opportunities.

I'm writing this at the end of the first week of our Extraordinary Women of the Bible programme and it's made me think more about art as a resource for our activities. Three exhibitions come to mind:

- An exhibition we held of alpine photographs by a Christian mountain photographer we invited members of the congregation to select a photograph and link it on display with a piece of scripture or Christian writing, unsure whether people would be prepared to do so. We were oversubscribed, with very thoughtful submissions
- Our Heritage Weekend exhibition of art by prisoners from HMP Send very varied and high quality
- The icon-style paintings of 7 Extraordinary Women each of which represents much more than the woman pictured. Through its detail it tells the story with which the woman was involved and how her role is key to God's story, stimulating thought and discussion and giving fresh insights. For example, Miriam's quick thinking enabled her brother Moses to survive, prosper and ultimately lead the Jewish people out of Egypt and on towards the promised land.

What have we learned:

- The exhibitions are a draw and a great conversation starter with visitors, even with those who have come to visit for other reasons
- The prison art exhibition helped the prisoners' confidence and self-esteem, even though they couldn't be present in person they were thrilled that a church was prepared to showcase their art (and pleased by the sales achieved). Visitors were equally impressed that we made the art available for community viewing
- The Extraordinary Women paintings have been fertile ground for studying oft-neglected parts of the Bible story, helpful both for us and visitors, triggering Bible study in a different and creative way.

Guildford St. Mary's continued

Taking it forward:

- We'll look for more opportunities and learn lessons from what's happened so far to make more of these resources
- There's always scope for improving channels of publicity!
- Art can provide a basis for involving schools more, something we view as a priority
- We're happy to share lessons, ideas and resources with other churches do get in touch if you'd like a chat with our team
- Our Thursday lunchtime Advent Reflections will build on the rich vein of thinking about the vital role women play in God's story.
- I now (belatedly) recognise art can be a very valuable tool for churches to use in mission and discipleship!

ROC Conversation joins the dots for Woking

On 24 October, 111 people met at Trinity Methodist Church, Woking to take part in the ROC Woking conversation run by a steering group from Trinity and other local churches. It brought together individuals from the local Council, Police, other statutory agencies, education, faith and community groups, businesses and community-minded residents. The aim of the evening was to identify all the good community work taking place within the borough, join some dots and identify gaps in provision.

The Mayor, Cllr. Louise Morales and Will Forster, M.P. welcomed guests to the evening, including the Lord Lieutenant, Michael More-Molyneux and High Sheriff, Shahid Azeem. During the event, leading figures in Woking including Leader of Woking Council, Cllr. Ann-Marie Barker and Head of Woking College, Bret Freeman shared their perspectives. Also speaking were Woking Community Hospice Clinical Operations Director, Tammy Stracey, Head of Woking Environmental Action, Ellen Pirie, lead at Woking Food Bank, Alison Buckland, CEO of Methodist Care Homes, Sam Monaghan, and Luke Greening PCSO for Woking.

It was a structured conversation following the pattern of the first ROC conversation in Woking four years ago and similar community conversations held up and down the country by national charity, Redeeming Our Communities. Delegates were gathered around tables of eight with table hosts who facilitated the conversation and scribes to capture everything that was shared.

There is already so much amazing community support work taking place within Woking and good working relationships between the statutory and voluntary sector. Our aim was for this 'conversation' to build on these links and maximise the effectiveness of community support being offered to Woking, as well as exploring where the gaps in activity and greatest needs are. There was a real buzz about the evening and we are hoping to see new connections made and new collaborations to support our community.

The next step will be to produce a report from all the information gathered during the conversation, which will identify key issues facing Woking's communities and offer possible solutions. Needs coming out so far from the analysis show young people, mental health and isolation coming high on the list, followed by elderly people and the need for suitable buildings for activities and organisations needing more volunteers.
