Dear Friends,

Rivers do not drink their own water; trees do not eat their own fruit; the sun does not shine on itself and flowers do not spread their fragrance for themselves. Living for others is a rule of nature. We are born to help each other. No matter how difficult it is...Life is good when you are happy; but much better when others are happy because of you. Pope Francis

It seems obvious to me - but I think it is worth reminding ourselves (particularly after the last week or two) that life in our communities and our society is so much better when we live our lives for others as well as for ourselves. Both of those things are important. Jesus said - 'Love others as you love yourself.' Love of self is important. That's not about putting ourselves selfishly in front of others all the time, but it is about tending to our needs. Being kind to ourselves, not constantly looking for reasons to beat ourselves up over things that we haven't done. Not feeling guilty all the time. All of that is crucially important. Learning to be kind to ourselves, learning to love ourselves is an important part of what Jesus is saying here.

BUT - a big part of that is also learning to love others as well. Learning that we are born to help each other is a huge part of what it means to be alive. Learning to accept that we need help from time to time is also a huge part of that. As we step away from the riots of the past days and look at our society again, we need to preach this message more strongly than ever. The world is a happier place if other people in the world are happier because of us. And as far as Jesus is concerned, that's **all** people. The people who look and speak like us and those that don't. The people who we agree with and those who we don't. There are lots of people and organisations at the moment in the world who, for a range of different motives, want to sow anger and fear. I'm tired of that agenda - and as a Christian it is deep in my DNA to talk and act and think in ways that make love more clear in the world.

So, I am more thankful than I can ever express for saintly people who live that message out. People who walk this path of living out love. People like Sylvia Kelley who I was so sorry to hear of her passing. Sylvia, who lived out a life of love both at a circuit level and at Godalming. Her work as a circuit steward in the former Guildford and Godalming Circuit and her commitment to safeguarding in all areas, and whose work with young people lived out a life that shared happiness with others. Saintly people who by their lives and example live out that message of Pope Francis.

So, we continue to live for love and peace and to share happiness and grace and love and we give humble thanks for those who have shown us how it is done.

The Surrey Hills Wood Fair


Cranleigh Showground, 7 & 8 September 10am to 6pm
