Response to the reading

Christ is Risen! Happy Easter!

This is the day where, all around the world, for the last two thousand years, the Christian church has celebrated and told again the story of Easter Sunday – the story of Jesus' resurrection.

The forty days in the wilderness of Lent have passed. The drama and horror of Holy Week is behind us, and we join together to celebrate that Jesus is alive – Hallelujah! Thank God! If you normally use the Vine at Home alone, or were planning to read through this reflection in private, perhaps today is a day you could find an opportunity to worship with someone else? If that's possible for you, now is your moment – even if it involves ringing someone up and asking them if they'll come over and read it with you, or sing the songs suggested at the end of the service together.

Because part of the miracle of Easter is that we are not alone. We are part of a huge congregation of people who live out the resurrection – we are an Easter people, and today is our day of feasting and joy.

Of course, the Jesus story doesn't make all our own pain and doubt and grief go away. And that's another crucial part of the story of today – that Jesus suffers with us, Jesus

understands the darkest places we go to, and yet Jesus is bigger than all that suffering. That's what resurrection means: the worst thing is never the last thing.

As Matthew describes it to us, that first Easter Sunday morning is chaotic, dramatic and terrifying. Then the angel speaks some familiar words, familiar at least to anyone who has been visited by an angel, 'Do not be afraid'...

Then: 'He is not here; for he has been raised'.

Some questions for us this Easter:

- What does 'resurrection' mean to you? Is it just about an old story, or does it speak to a deeper truth?
- How can you share stories of resurrection with people you might meet this week?
- The angel says 'He is not here, for he has been raised'. Where are you looking for meaning, for God, in your life? Is it in the equivalent of an empty tomb? Where do you think the angels would tell you to go if they could stand in front of you today?

- Give thanks for these moments, and ask God to show you how to be loving, and overflow with divine love into the world around you.

 Seek a moment of quiet today, and reflect. If it helps, read this poem, an invitation to stillness (written by Tim Baker)

- Pray about it. If you can, talk to someone from the church about what you've prayed about.

Saturday 14th April

- Today, you might like to pick a 'prayer mantra' to repeat to yourself several times during the day, to help you focus on God, and to remind yourself that everything can be done prayerfully.
- Choose a mantra that works for you, but you could use one of these options;
 - o 'Thank you for loving me, God'.
 - 'Show me what is mine to do, O God.'
 - o 'The Lord my God, the Lord is one'.
 - 'Love your neighbour as yourself'.
 - o 'Faith, hope and love endure'.
